Feature Plant of the Month

Buckbrush, Coral Berry Symphoricarpos orbiculatus

Pops of color can still be seen on the winter landscape in the clusters of magenta berries of this shrub. Also referred to as Indian currant, this species occurs in open woods, fields, pastures, and thickets, spreading by runners to create large groupings. It is adaptable to a wide variety of soil conditions. It could be misconstrued as bush honeysuckle since it's in the same family, Caprifoliaceae, but rest assured, this is a native species. In the summer, it produced bell-shaped white flowers which eventually transform into the clusters of berries in the fall. Coral berry are a popular food source for white-tailed deer. The buds and berries are consumed by bobwhite quail and robins. Their density and low growth form make this shrub an excellent candidate for wildlife cover.

ILLINOIS NATIVE PLANT SOCIETY 2020 RESEARCH GRANT AND SURVEY GRANT PROGRAMS ANNOUNCED

Students, citizen scientists, conservation groups and institutions are alerted to consider applying for a grant ranging from \$500-\$1500 to fund one-year projects. The grant is for research-focused studies on Illinois native plants such as life history, reproductive biology, demography, genetics, comparative site inventories, community ecology, as well as research on threats to native plants and communities, such as invasive species. Laboratory research as well as projects focused on **research** relating to education about or restoration of native plants and plant communities will be considered. Projects involving student research or volunteers will be given special consideration.

All projects must demonstrate how they support the mission of the Illinois Native Plant Society. Full application details and form for the Research Grant are NOW on-line. Check our website at <u>https://ill-inps.org</u>. Applications must be received by January 31, 2020. Awards will be announced by March 31, 2020.

INPS is also excited to initiate a new, second grant program this year: the **Survey Grant Program**. This grant up to \$1500 will fund searches for Illinois Endangered, Threatened or Rare species for which current data is inadequate to assess their status and for which field surveys and recovery recommendations are needed. INPS is working with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to develop a priority list for the surveys. Experienced botanical field surveyors, either independent or associated with an institution, are invited to apply for this grant. Partnerships are encouraged. Interested parties should

Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation Program, Pollinator Meadows

Help us spread the word about the Foundation's new Pollinator Meadows Pilot Grant Program. The program will support the conversion of turf grass to pollinator habitat in public spaces (i.e. museum and college campuses, nature centers, municipal building sites, etc) by reimbursing up to \$20,000 or 50% (whichever is less) of the costs related to the design, installation, and first year of care. The fifth annual backyard maple syrup production workshop will be held on Saturday, February 1, 2020 from 10am-12pm at the Dixon Springs Agricultural Center, located at 354 State Highway 145 N, Simpson, IL 62985. This program is free and open to the public.

The program will cover tree identification, equipment needs, tree tapping, sap collection, boiling, and finishing maple syrup. Participants will see firsthand the processes involved in making maple syrup. We will have a demonstration of a syrup evaporator and an optional tour of a sugarbush forest, managed for maple syrup production and utilizing a pipeline system of sap collection. New this year is taste-testing maple syrup produced right here at Dixon Springs!

The University of Illinois Extension will provide some activities for kids, including taste testing of real maple syrup!
