The Rare Plant Hunter Strikes Again!



By Chris Benda: Several times this season I have shared stories and photos of rare plants found in flower in southern Illinois. My search to photograph every species of flowering plant in southern Illinois is a challenging one, and although it is getting late in the season there are still rare plants to be found. Recently I went to the Cretaceous Hills Nature Preserve in southern Pope County to photograph a rare Meadow-beauty (Rhexia mariana) in bloom. I missed catching that rare plant flowering, but I was able to find another rare plant in bloom! Narrow-leaved Sunflower (Helianthus angustifolius) is a rare species in southern Illinois. Like many plants in this region, the species is at the edge of its range here and is only documented from three Illinois counties.

The Southern Chapter of the Illinois Native Plant Society is pleased to host a presentation by Dr. Nancy Garwood entitled: **Southern Illinois** *Ranunculaceae* (The **Buttercup Family) in a Global Perspective** October 16th, 2012 at 6:30pm at the Carbondale Township Hall 217 East Main St., Carbondale, IL

The *Ranunculaceae* (Buttercup family) is diverse and complicated in its floral biology. It includes many common wildflowers like Wild Columbine, False Rue Anemone, Larkspur, Monkshood, Doll's Eyes, Thimbleweed, and Goldenseal. *Ranunculus* means "little frog" and refers to the moist habitats these plants occupy. A family of 1700 species, there are 60 genera distributed worldwide.

Hike to Boss Island, Cache River SNA October 28th, 2012

Meet at Noon at the Wildcat Bluff parking lot

(from Vienna, take highway 45 south and turn right (west) on the first Ballowe Church Road. Follow to Hawkins Road and turn right. At the T, turn left on Wildcat Bluff Road, parking lot is at the end of the road.)



Boss Island is a remarkable feature in the heart of the Cache River State Natural Area. Cypress swamps juxtaposed with rocky uplands make this a truly unique area. Views of Little Black Slough abound from the cliffs around Boss Island, and this time of year one can see one of the best wildflower explosions in southern Illinois. Nodding Bur Marigold (*Bidens cernua*), in the sunflower family, can be seen in full glorious bloom, if our timing is right. Either way, this is a lovely walk on what will hopefully be a beautiful Sunday afternoon.

Forrest Keeling Nursery in Elsberry, MO is having a 50% off sale on some of their older perennials. Here are some of the species they may have: Obedient Plant, Prairie Dropseed, Big bluestem, Little bluestem, Side oat gramma, Carex, Rudbeckia, Ruellia, Solidago, New Jersey tea, Baptisia, Coreopsis, Prairie bundle flower, Echinacea, Rattlesnake master, Sneezeweed. Soft rush. Sunflowers. Iris. Liatris. and Lobelia.



Most pots are normally \$4.25, so these will probably be a couple of dollars. NOTE: these are not perfect plants. They're overgrown and gone to seed, and any given pot may have a few different plants growing in it. There's not a good inventory, and you shouldn't go looking for a specific plant. However, if you're looking for a variety of native plants, this could be a good deal.

They will want to move these plants before the end of the season, so it's best to go fairly soon. You can call them ahead of time to double-check the status of the sale.

Warmer Temperatures Make New USDA Plant Zone Map Obsolete

ScienceDaily (Sep. 13, 2012) - Gardeners and landscapers may want to rethink their fall tree plantings. Warming temperatures have already made the U.S. Department of Agriculture's new cold-weather planting

guidelines obsolete, according to Dr. Nir Krakauer, assistant professor of civil engineering in The City College of New York's Grove School of Engineering. The new USDA Plant Hardiness Zone Map, which predicts which trees and perennials can survive the winter in a given region, was a long time coming. Temperature boundaries shown in the latest version have shifted northward since the last one appeared in 1990. FYI -- Indian Lotus, Nelumbo nucifera. In news brief from IDNR.

Request for assistance in determining distribution of new invasive plant found in Lake Vermilion. Nelumbo nucifera (sacred or Indian lotus) has been found covering a substantial portion of Lake Vermilion in Danville, IL (just east of Champaign). The recently discovered population is most likely an aquatic garden escapee. Illinois Department of Natural Resources is trying to determine if this is an isolated population or if other populations of this species exist in the state. Some identifying features of the plant: native lotus have yellow petals and nearly round seeds while the exotic lotus has pink or white petals with seeds that are oblong. Leave Nature Alone? - A blog essay by Stephen Packard

How much meddling with the ecosystem is too much? Or, to look at the flip side, when does "leave it alone" become shameful neglect? This is a report on the white-fringed orchid (Platanthera leucophaea) at Somme Prairie Grove. It's a drama of a threatened species coming back from the brink.

Under modern conditions, neglected populations of this classic prairie species die out. Without our help, this orchid (and many, many species) would soon be gone from the Earth.

My adventure with the orchid began in the late 1970s when I was just starting my career. I got a report that a young fellow had found it in a forest preserve. Rufino Osorio grew up in a rough and crime-ridden inner city neighborhood, but his grandmother in Puerto Rico had introduced him to the love of plants. In Chicago, he figured out that the Montrose Avenue bus would take him to Schiller Woods Forest Preserve along the Des Plaines River. It was an Eden to him, in many ways. But when he found the orchid, he had to tell somebody. Rufino called the Audubon Society, and they put him through to me at the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission. Genome Run: Andean Shrub is First New Plant Species Described by its DNA

It took a colorful floral species from South America, Brunfelsia plowmaniana, to finally break botany's nomenclatural gene barrier. A flowering shrub from the Andean cloud forests made taxonomic history last month. The plant had puzzled botanists for decades as they endeavored to determine whether or not it was truly an evolutionary newcomer. When its DNA revealed this to be true, researchers made the unprecedented move to include the plant's genetic code in its description as a new species. That decision could open the door to future DNA definitions of new botanical species—and heal a rift in the field of botany.
