Feature Plant of the Month Serviceberry, Amelanchier arborea

Serviceberry, or Shadbush, is a representative from the Rose (Rosaceae) family. It is a small understory shrub that grows in upland forests and edges. The name serviceberry was given to this species because of its blooming time and its association with funeral services from olden times. Serviceberry blooms very early in the spring, usually in late March and early April. When the serviceberry bloomed, it was a sign that the ground had thawed enough to bury those that had passed away during the cold winter and that a "service" could be held for them. Another name that was given to the shrub was shadbush. This is also because of the early blooming time which would signal the timing for the shad to return to their spawning grounds. Plants of Concern: A Rare Plant Monitoring Program in Illinois Sunday, February 26th 1-2 p.m.

The unglaciated terrain of extreme southern Illinois is home to a variety of plant species not found in the rest of the state, making many of them rare to Illinois. Yes the resources available to monitor and protect them are more limited. To alleviate this, the Plants of Concern (POC) program based out of the Chicago Botanic Garden seeks volunteers to help monitor rare plants. Housed in the Gibson lab at Southern Illinois University, coordinator Chris Benda organizes volunteer community scientists to monitor rare plants and report population data. Invasive Bradford Pears Trees to be Banned in Ohio in 2023

The Bradford pear tree was introduced to North America in the 1960s from China and Taiwan, brought by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Soon the medium-sized landscaping tree became the most popular ornamental tree, prized for its glorious blooms in spring and long-lasting colors in autumn. The Ohio DNR has added Bradford

pear, to the list of invasive species. As of January 1, 2023, Callery pear will be illegal to sell, grow, or plant in Ohio state. Property owners are not mandated to remove existing trees in their yards, because the new law only applies to banning new trees from being sold and planted. Pennsylvania also banned it earlier this year.

The grants will also help communities prepare for these disasters by planting more diverse disease and storm-resistant shade trees. Projects may include planting trees along streets, trails, community entryways, schools, public buildings, parks and more. Funding from this grant round must be used for spring 2023 plantings.
